So we will continue on the internet conference platform Zoom for this coming season. Should the situation change we will investigate ways of combining live and Zoom formats, this latter having proved very popular with a significant proportion of our membership. Invitations with details of how to join the meetings on Zoom will be sent a few days before each lecture to all members who have provided the Society with an e-mail address. All lectures will start at 7:30 p.m. The host will open the meeting at 7:00 p.m. to enable members to foregather in a virtual waiting room until granted admission.

The playlist of available recordings (currently seven) will be updated and re-issued periodically to new and existing members for whom we have an e-mail address, or you can ask the chairman for it at any time.

Shadow-Makers: episodes in the cultural history of shadows in architecture

Lecturer: Stephen Kite

Wednesday 13th October 2021



In this talk Stephen examines episodes in the little-explored cultural history of shadows in architecture based on the research that led to his book *Shadow-Makers: a cultural history of shadows in architecture* (Bloomsbury, 2017); a study whose narrative – combining close readings of significant buildings both ancient and modern with architectural theory and art history – reveals the key places and moments where shadows have shaped architecture in distinctive and dynamic ways. Major figures examined in the lecture include: Nicholas Hawksmoor, Sir John Soane, and John Ruskin.

Stephen studied at Newcastle University and is a past chairman of this Society. Now an Emeritus Professor at the Welsh School of Architecture, Cardiff University, his research explores the history and theory of architecture, and its wider links to visual culture. His many publications include *Building Ruskin's Italy: Watching architecture* (2012). Currently his research examines the faces of British architecture (1840-2000).

How to read a Quaker meeting house

Most churches and chapels have obvious architectural reference points – pulpit, sanctuary, table, pews – but Quaker meeting houses seem to be defined by an absence of such things. The talk will describe what to look for in a Quaker meeting house and discuss what that might tell us about Quaker worship and the age and history of the building.

Chris Skidmore is a Quaker and retired academic whose interests lie in denominational and architectural history. He has been for the last 13 years the Hon. Editor of The Chapels Society. His book – *Quakers and their Meeting Houses* – will be published by Historic England in November.

An Acquaintance with Pevsner

Revising Pevsner's Yorkshire: North Riding

Lecturer: Jane Grenville

Wednesday 13th April 2022



With his wife Lola as driver, Pevsner toured the North Riding in the summer of 1963 and loved everything about it - the buildings, the scenery and especially the people. The resulting volume was famously dedicated to 'those publicans and hoteliers...who provide me with a table ... to scribble on'. Unlike others in the series, it did not undergo a thorough desk-top edit in the 70's or 80's, so Jane was commissioned to carry out the first comprehensive revision since 1966. In the course of her work she got to know the man - understanding his enthusiasms, his dislikes, and (by working out his routes) his curious omissions.

This lecture will cover Pevsner's background and that of the Buildings of England series before going on to give a (necessarily selective) account of Jane's work of the past five years.
